UPCOMING CHORAL TECHNIQUES FOR

CONDUCTORS WORKSHOP

We're excited that Joel Tranquilla, Conductor of the Windsor Classic Chorale and the Windsor Symphony Chorus, will lead us in a workshop of Choral Techniques for conductors. He'll talk about basic conducting technique, score preparation and organization of the choral rehearsal, among other topics. Joel, who has a Bachelor of Music degree from Mt. Alison University in his native New Brunswick, is currently in the doctoral conducting program at Michigan State University. JOANNE QUIMBY MEMORIAL BURSARY

Joanne Quimby served as organist in a number of churches in Essex County. Although she had only a basic education in organ, she loved the instrument, and took additional lessons in order to improve her playing.

The Joanne Quimby Memorial Bursary will be available to organists like Joanne who have basic skills, but do not have RCCO, Conservatory or University qualifications and are currently employed in a church. To qualify, an applicant must be a member of the RCCO or a Centre Friend. Applicants will be auditioned by an independent panel of judges (no RCCO members) and there will be a maximum of one student per year until the money runs out. The amount of the bursary will be \$500 (10 lessons at \$50 apiece).

The first award will be available in the spring of 2012.

<u>REPORT ON THEATRE</u> <u>ORGAN CONCERT</u>

Our RCCO Centre hosted its first ever theatre organ concert, a sure sign that the RCCO is not a collection of musicians of limited scope.

On October 27, Bedford United Church hosted this event. It recently was the recipient of a wonderful gift, a new pipe organ. A small 1953 Casavant, Opus 2189, was moved from Sarnia. Additional elements were added from Chalmer United Church,



Woodstock. The benefactor ensured that Dodington and Dodington Pipe Organ Services assembled a mighty instrument with 65 stops that is capable of all styles of organ music, including the theatre organ genre.

Bedford organist Ron Dossenbach started the show with two brief tunes, including The Simpsons Theme. The Youtube video link shows what it sounds like.

Then Bob Nagy played a few theatre organ tunes, complete with Hallowe'en schtick. Both schtick and music were well-received by the enthusiastic audience. Bob, supply organist to Bedford and several other nearby churches, deserves a special round of thanks for a concert that almost did not occur. Early in the planning stages, there were insufficient performers with insufficient repertoire. Then Bob called on his friends from his time as a member of the Motor City Theater Organ Society, which led to the final performer, John Lauter.

John is a renowned theatre organist who has given solo theatre organ concerts across the United States and Canada. We were treated to a full concert, from Gershwin and show tunes to Raiders of the Lost Ark to show tunes. All of this was delivered with entertaining and humorous narrative.

He repeatedly praised the wonderful blend of classical and theatre organ sonorities that are available. Lauter deserves credit for giving us the full theatre organ treatment on a two manual instrument without second touch.

The organ's benefactor, John Robson, has a long held belief that the organ should be used for entertainment as well as worship. We certainly were entertained. Thanks again, John.
