

DETAILS:

Dates will be determined based on availability of participants

and scheduled between February and May 2015 (see sessions below). Applications for the examination are to be submitted by March 15, 2015. Our instructors will be appropriately qualified local organ teachers. Organs, venues and more details will be announced soon.



The Service Playing Certificate examination may be taken at the College's regular June examination sessions or at any time of the year, with the playing/recording an audio file, on CD or in a computer file. The Service Playing Certificate is a prerequisite for the new diploma of Colleague (CRCCO) in Service Playing.

Let's aim for 100 % participation from our members and then we will challenge all other RCCO Centres in Canada to break our momentous record.

 - b) Preludes to a funeral;
 - c) Preludes to a service of public worship.

Session 4

- Master Class playing your selected repertoire
- How to give and receive feedback
- Additional resources/assistance, next steps and preparing for your examination

Additional Note: We have ascertained from the RCCO Examination Requirements listed at www.RCCO.ca that there is no expectation to transpose an organ piece by sight at the Service Playing Certificate Level. This is a component of the Service Playing Diploma Examination.

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Travelling Clinician Program Workshop

Encyclopedia of Pipe Organ Stops

Pipe Organ Encounter

In April, we conducted a Pipe Organ Encounter course over a three week period as part of the spring semester of Elder-College. David Palmer, Ron Doessenbach, Don Pole and

Paul Wharram conducted sessions for some 15 participants. Topics included the history and development of the pipe organ, construction and design (pipes, action, wind system, console), current trends in organ building and refurbishment, an overview of organ repertoire (Renaissance, Baroque, Classical, Romantic, Modern), an opportunity to play the organ at All Saints Church and a visit to hear and see the Cooper Aeolian organ at the Morris Sutton Funeral Home.

Because of the interest generated by this course, the Windsor Campus has invited us to organize an Organ Crawl to visit and hear several other organs in Windsor. Plans are being finalized and we anticipate this one-day course will be sometime in April 2015.

Similarly, we have been invited to work with the Chatham RCCO and local campus of ElderCollege to mount a Pipe Organ Encounter on September 23, 30 and October 7 in Chatham. The organs and churches involved will be Holy Trinity, St. Andrew's United and Christ Church.

Cooper Aeolian Organ Awarded Historical Citation

The RCCO's Historical Organ Committee awards citations to organs that qualify on the basis of age and level of originality. Organs usually need to be at least 100 years old without modifications like new consoles, tonal changes, expansions, and other modifications. They consider younger organs in certain cases. They did just that with the Cooper Aeolian Organ. When the 1924 instrument was moved from its Walkerville mansion to the Morris Sutton Funeral home in 1946, it was done with no modifications of any kind. Thus, it sounds exactly as it did originally. The roll player element also performs perfectly without modern alterations. There are only two organs in Canada capable of playing rolls.

As a result, it was awarded the A Citation, its highest level of recognition, one of only 20 to be so recognized in all of Canada. The formal presentation was made to Allen MacKenzie, senior Director of Arbor Memorial, at the Annual General Meeting on June 6, 2014.

The RCCO Windsor Centre also presented its own certificate of appreciation to Morris Sutton, as they have been very supportive in every way to make the restoration project possible. For full RCCO members, watch for an upcoming article in Organ Canada, our national magazine.

New Service

To our members and community

Churches and other organizations contemplating the purchase of a new organ, the renovation of an already existing one, the construction of a new sanctuary or modification of an existing one have many questions and often do not know where to turn to get answers or advice, except for speaking to a reputable organ builder.

Where is the organ to be located? What about its placement in relationship to the choir? Should it be a pipe organ or an electronic? What about "combination organs" that utilize both pipes and digitally sampled voices? What about the organ console? Should it have 56 or 61 keys? What factors should be considered in deciding upon the final appearance of the instrument? Is an organ worth renovating? What should be retained? What should a church expect during a renovation process?

These are only some of the questions that would likely be asked prior to beginning the process of purchasing a new organ or renovating an already existing instrument. These questions are best answered before employing an organ building company which is primarily concerned with their interests, having a financial stake in the bidding process.

The RCCO Windsor centre is pleased to announce that Ron Dossenbach, a member of our executive committee, has agreed to create a new portfolio – a service to offer organists, churches and other organizations in Windsor and Essex County. The position is called 'organ advisor' and here are some of the responsibilities:

Visit churches and other sites with functioning organs; offer advice on upkeep and maintenance; and assist with 'quick fix' solutions to minor issues

Explain ongoing responsibilities such as keeping accurate

notes for technicians, proper relationships with technicians, tuning visit obligations, etc.

- Visit churches and other sites with organs which are either in disrepair or have not been used for some time and offer preliminary impressions and assessments
- Answer questions about organ building, renovation, relocation or resale
- Describe the bidding process, translate terminology used by organ builders, share web-based resources and outline options for further exploration
- □ Suggest site visits to see other organs or installations
- Suggest competent, qualified builders, and
- Assist as requested in the development of plans for the provision of a suitable instrument.

As many of you know, Ron has been involved personally in the building and refurbishment of several organs, notably the Cooper Aeolian Organ at the Morris Sutton Funeral Home in addition to the organ at his church, Bedford United.



This is a free service

available to our members and the community during the 'pre-consultant' phase of specific projects. Depending upon the circumstances in each situation, engaging a technician, launching a bidding process and/or contracting an organ builder may be recommended.

Highlights from our Annual General Meeting

The 2013 – 2014 Annual General Meeting of the Windsor RCCO Centre was held at All Saints' Anglican Church, Windsor, on June 6, 2013. It was very encouraging to have so many in attendance - over 35 participants! We gathered for a Service of Worship in the church sanctuary during which all of our organ students played. Jonathan Kaberuka played Trio in D-flat (Josef Rheinberger) and Tyler Harangozo played Prière (from Suite gothique by Leon Boëllmann) as preludes; Anita Sehra played Soliloguy by Healey Willan as a voluntary; and Cameron Adams played Festive Flight (Gilbert Martin) and Joyce Fung played Toccata (Eugene Gigout) as postludes. Each student also played a hymn during the service. Everyone was very impressed with their organ skills.

Following the Service, a delicious dinner of roasted chicken with vegetables and salad followed by strawberry shortcake was served prepared by the ladies of the church.

This was followed by our Annual General Meeting. Each executive committee member formally presented their annual report and answered questions.

Our President gave an overview of programs being planned for 2014 – 2015 details of which can be found in this newsletter.

The Rev. Canon Kim Van Allen and David Palmer gave a presentation entitled "Secrets of a Perfect Partnership: Clergy and Organist." Many thoughts and ideas were shared in an engaging and well-thought out dialogue. They stressed the importance of regular and open communication, joint planning and flexibility - always bearing in mind that music is meant to contribute to the act of worship and is integral to creating an environment conducive to meaningful worship.

A Citation was given by Ron Dossenbach to Al McKenzie, Senior Director of Arbor Memorial Inc. and the Morris Sutton Funeral Home for the Board's support and encouragement in restoring their Cooper Aeolian organ.
