PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear RCCO Members and Friends,

What started as a strategy as the incoming President to become acquainted with our membership, evolved into an opportunity to solicit feedback and input about programs and activities.

A total of 21 people (72 % of our members) participated in the survey, which for any survey or questionnaire is a very high rate of participation. Although the survey questions were open-ended and there was some overlap, a number of trends and common themes surfaced and a good number of specific suggestions came forward, which are all worthy of consideration.

A report summarizing the feedback was written and presented to the executive committee. Its purpose going forward will be to guide our programming and services. All members who are on our email list received a copy of this report and I hope you have had an opportunity to read it. Here are just a few highlights: readings as the most interesting and informative activity organized by the Centre. Mention was made of the value of being introduced to music for small and aging choirs. Choral workshops and sessions related to choral techniques and conducting figured prominently by 24% of the survey participants. Workshops on basic organ technique, registration and pedaling were mentioned by 20% of the respondents. Mentions were also made of interest in new and accessible organ music. Concerts (including members' recitals) and social gatherings including the spaghetti dinners received equal mention by 17% of our members.

39% of the survey participants cited developmental workshops of some kind as their greatest need. There were a number of topics suggested beyond organ technique skills development (10%) which included the following:

MEET OUR SCHOLARSHIP STUDENTS (PART 2)

The majority of our scholarship recipients are high school students but this year we have two who are over 20 years of age, Tyler Harangozo and Joyce Fung.

Tyler is unusual in that be began to play the organ without the benefit of lessons. His piano lessons were with a former scholarship winner, Sarah Bestvater, but when he wished to learn to play the organ he obtained a Baldwin organ being discarded by a church and installed it in his home. He also invested in organ shoes. Consequently, when he auditioned for the scholarship he played a couple of pieces on the organ instead of the piano, and, I might add, played quite well. He attends Wayne State University where he majors in History and works part time at Omega Tool Corporation. He also plays for some church services. His teacher is David Palmer.

Joyce Fung has an extensive background in music. She has Grade 10 RCM piano, played in the University of Windsor's Jazz Ensemble, has sung in the Windsor Classic Chorale, served as church accompanist in several churches including the University Community Church here in Windsor. This is just a sampling of her many musical activities. At present she is doing her residency to become a doctor, specializing in family medicine, while also studying organ with David Palmer.

In the September newsletter I described Brian Sweetman's two students, Cameron Adams and Kayla Falkenholt. The Falkenholts have now moved to Thunder Bay. Before leaving Kayla completed five lessons and, since she will miss the Masterclass scheduled for December 8, she played the Prelude and a hymn during the morning service at Church of the Epiphany and then, in the afternoon, put on a mini-recital for friends and family at the same church. Since the Thunder Bay Centre has a scholarship programme we have forwarded the rest of the money for Kayla's scholarship to them and arranged for her to take the remainder of her lessons there.

Membership Engagement

In response to feedback received through various mechanisms at the national level, the culture of the RCCO is perceived to be 'unwelcoming'. To address this issue, the National Council at its meeting on November 8 and 9 in Toronto, approved in principle stage 1 of a Membership Engagement Campaign.

The goal is to enhance the sense of 'community' throughout the RCCO and in particular at the Centre level. This notion of 'community' has been highlighted in the new RCCO mission statement: "to enrich lives and cultivate community through organ and choral music." As was mentioned in council, our future focus should be more about our members and friends as a 'community of people' rather than an 'institution'. It was emphasized that the social aspect of our activities, the networking with other organ and choral music enthusiasts, the sharing of our experiences and resources, our collaboration and cooperation and the inclusive nature of what we do is perhaps more important than our products and services.

The proposed Membership Engagement Campaign is based on the 'value for value' concept in which the focus is on the individual member and the perceived value they receive in exchange for the monetary value they contribute for membership. To attract new members and retain existing ones, the perceived value must be greater than the membership fees.

An interesting question was raised at the National Council meeting - with an estimated 8,000 organists in Canada, why are only 1,061 registered members of the RCCO? It is felt that our culture must change to be one of inclusion rather than alienation. This starts at the Centre level where newcomers are made to feel welcomed and encouraged and where friendly unbiased person-to-person contact is a fundamental characteristic of Centre life. Our membership strategy must, in short, become one of attraction rather than promotion.

The campaign has four stages the first being Awareness - creating awareness amongst our members of the value of 'belonging' and how we as a community help each other. Centres are being encouraged to deliver

these messages through a multi-media multi-channel approach making use of testimonial videos, interviews with members and highlighting the involvement of young people and scholarship students. The other three stages of the approach include Re-purposing for Outreach, Membership Engagement and Promotion.

The Windsor Essex RCCO executive committee embraces the concept of community and will work to create a culture of belonging and inclusion. We welcome your thoughts, ideas and suggestions in this regard and as information about the Membership Enhancement Campaign evolves, we will keep you up-to-date.
