President's Message

On February 15, 2015, I had the privilege of participating in a Celebration of Music Ministry commemorating Bob Kissner's 25 years as the choir director and organist at Epworth United Church in Kingsville.

The sanctuary was filled to capacity with members of the church, friends and supporters from the community as well as the members and their families of the Kingsville Fire Department.

For over two wonderful hours, we sang Bob's favourite hymns, heard beautifully sung solos, a mixed quartet, a men's quintet, and choir anthems and delighted in the ringing of the bell choir, which Bob initiated in 1992. We delighted in the tributes to Bob and the expressions of appreciation from members of his choir.

Bob, in turn, shared some of his memories and experiences, thanking especially the choir whose combined years of singing in the choir totaled over 500, with one bass having been a member for more than 60 years. In his presentation to the children, Bob explained the workings of the magnificent Casavant organ, much to their enthusiasm and interest.

Rev. John van Omme, in his message to the congregation, cited the names of the organists over the 100 plus year history of the organ and spoke about the musical activities they inspired: an actively engaged choir throughout the church's history, community choral events, an 80-voice award-winning children's choir as well as teaching on the keyboard and music education in Kingsville and beyond.

As I reflected on Bob's contribution to his church and learned of the history of music at Epworth church, I was struck with the realization that we, as church organists and musicians, can and do have an incredible impact on individuals, church congregations and our communities at large. I am sure we all can recall instances when people have thanked us for moving them with the playing or singing of a particular favourite hymn, when the magnificence of the organ has uplifted a lonely soul or the interpretation of a choral rendition has healed a wounded heart.

We play the organ and piano, conduct and sing in choirs and lead in music worship because we enjoy it and are called to use our talents in this way. We sometimes don't fully comprehend the meaningful impact we have on people's lives nor the legacy we are building.

From the bottom of my heart, I want to thank you all of you – our members,

In Memorium: Ron Kingham

It is with sadness that we inform you of the passing of Ron Kingham. Ron was a long time member of our centre. Below is a tribute to Ron by a friend, Joyce Ward, who often accompanied him to events and concerts.

"I knew Ron for 43 years as he was my teacher at King George VI public school and Tecumseh High School where he taught instru-

mental and vocal music. He was always very passionate about teaching as well as performing music and this was clearly evident when you heard and watched him play. Among the many facets of his life which included organ building with his partner Donald Pole and harpsichord tuning for the Windsor Symphony Orchestra, Ron was also the organist and choir director at many churches in the area the last of which had me singing in his choir at St. John's the Evangelist in Leamington before he retired in June of 2014. He was admired; he inspired and will surely be missed."

A Memorial Concert will be held at St. Paul's Congregational Church (Park Avenue West) in Chatham on April 26 at 7:00 pm. There will be organists, pianists and choirs performing who were associated with Ron.

Getting ready for Easter

As I write this, it is a cold Sunday in February and Lent is just around the corner.

Observant Christians view Lent as a time for reflection, repentance, charitable giving and, perhaps most of all, waiting. The forty days of waiting are intended to bring us to the foot of the Cross and then to the joy of Easter.





Church organists and music directors have many of the same traditions and beliefs as the people in the pews. But our view of Lent is perhaps a tad different. My first reaction, when I realized this morning that Shrove Tuesday is in two days was "What! Already! That can't be right!"

While Lent proceeds with songs of faith and the increasingly sombre hymns leading to Good Friday, our heads are full of what we'll do for Easter. While some Christian traditions refrain from using the word "Hallelujah" during Lent, our choirs are practising the jump for joy anthems we want perfected for Easter Sunday. You might say we are, liturgically speaking, ahead of the game. We have to stay a few weeks ahead of our choirs in order to get the music ready. Our Lenten season this year should have begun around February the eighth at the latest. In the same way, Advent for us is a good three weeks before Advent for other folks. The entire liturgical year has a kind of fast forward aspect to it, and there's no rewind button either.

Here's hoping that we're all able to have some quiet time during Lent, to listen to the spaces between the notes and to bring our very best efforts to each Sunday of this special season.

Update

Plans have been finalized for the Development Workshop designed to prepare participants for the RCCO Service Playing and Worship Assistant Certificate examinations. A curriculum sub-committee has developed the content and set tentative dates for the sessions. The topics include an overview of the skills expected for each certificate, how to choose repertoire, developing good practice techniques, sight reading tips and tricks, the art of registration as well as hymn playing and anthem accompanying techniques. The workshop will include a one-on-one coaching session with an organ instructor for each participant. To date, 5 members have signed up.




Prepare! 2015-2016: An Ecumenical Music & Worship Planner

I read this book in its first edition (and sadly gave it away). I plan to purchase and read the newest edition.

It has groups for both the American Guild of Organists and Organists and the Organ (Musical Instrument). Recent discussions include—Life after a Fractured Femur, Digital Organs for home use, Pump Organs, Harpsichord in Worship, Recital materials for the Liturgical year. RCCO Vancouver also has a group, which I haven't looked at.

Wine & Organ Music Pairing

On Friday, February 20th, about 12 RCCO Members and Friends met at the home of the President for a unique evening pairing wine with organ music. Erie Shores is well known for its vineyards and wineries and the quality of its wines is being recognized internationally. Sommelier Carmen Danner selected six different wines from different boutique wineries in Essex County. After a few pointers on how to experience the look (sight), the nose



(smell and savour) and the taste (swirl and swish in the mouth) of wines, participants gathered around to watch and hear various organ pieces performed by and on a wide range of organists and organs – You Tube videos projected on a large screen with stereophonic sound.

The pieces were selected specifically to enhance each wine being tasted. For example, Colio Estate's Girls Night Out Sparkling Rosé was paired with a performance of Flight of the Bumble Bee by Carol Williams https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=hHZvMAJUN5g. The Posh Cuvée from CREW (Colchester Ridge Estate Winery) with its tantalizing blend of Chardonnay, Riesling, Vidal and Gewürztraminer grapes was paired with Bach's Sinfonia from Cantata 29. Diane Bish plays this incredible piece on the 117 Rank Ruffatti Organ of Coral Ridge Church in Forida. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=1Csynke0maE

Other wines included Chambourcin VQA (red) from Aleksander Estate Winery and Ripper Red from the Oxley Estate Winery.

The evening concluded with a wonderful 2008 Cabernet Ice Wine from Erie Shore Vineyard – a taste bud sensation of dark fruit and berry flavours perfect for serving with berries, crème brulée or caramelized fruit. We enjoyed this wine with some dark chocolate and Cameron Carpenter on his touring organ at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=zq_cy-ztcHc.

<u> Windsor Centre welcomes Colin Redekop,</u>

Travelling Clinician

"Your Choir Can Sing This" and "Where Do We Go from Here?" were the titles of Colin Redekop's two workshops, held Saturday, January 17 at Church of the Ascension on University Avenue in Windsor. Under the national Travelling Clinician program, Colin shared his expertise and experience with some two dozen Windsor Centre members.



In the morning, he introduced 11 choral pieces, from anthems to songs, chosen for their suitability to the small choir. Several members remarked that they had ordered a number of the titles for their own choirs.

While there had been an expectation of a talk on changing styles in worship, Colin concentrated on issues of self-care in maintaining one's focus in working as a church musician. He spoke of organist-clergy relations, stressing the need for open conversation between both, and on the importance of spelling out duties and obligations on both sides. His talk, referring to his personal situation in Calgary, generated wide discussion, moving into the area of changing expectations in worship music today.

Several members of Church of the Ascension's Brotherhood of Anglican Churchmen provided a tasty lunch.

Thanks go especially to Trudy DiCarlo, Organist and Choir Director, and to the men of the BAC and to Church of the Ascension for hosting the event.

Continuing Collaboration with ElderCollege
