With the unanimous support of our Executive Committee, Certificates of Appreciation were presented at the Annual General Meeting to Paulin Memorial Presbyterian Church and the Essex Christian Reformed Church.

Two Successful Courses with ElderCollege

In March, in partnership with ElderCollege, we hosted a three-session workshop entitled: *Sing? Over 30 participants registered for this event, including several of our own members and friends. A special word of thanks is extended to Nancy Tapley, Ron Dossenbach, Yvonne Quinn-Chittle, Bob Langlois and Henry Boon for facilitating and demonstrating the organs.

In Memoriam Marian Johns

Long-time honorary Centre Friend Marian Johns passed away April 22 at the age of 94. She was predeceased by her husband Professor Malcolm Johns, a former member of the Windsor-Essex Centre and a professor emeritus at Wayne State University.

Marian was born in Winston-Salem, NC and attended both Salem Academy and Salem College for Women, where she graduated summa cum laude.

She served as Choir Director at Grosse Pointe Memorial Church, and as Assistant Choir Director at Assumption Church in Windsor when Malcolm (Mack) was Music Director. They both founded the Grosse Pointe Community Chorus. She was also Church Archivist at Christ Church in Detroit, and created the Medieval Consort, a recorder group that performed at Noel Night and in various nursing homes throughout Detroit. Her life-long interest in Moravian music let her to be appointed an honorary trustee of the Moravian Music Foundation.
