# <u>President's Message</u>


November, 2015

# <u> Voice for Life Workshop</u>

### October 31

Participants in this workshop included a number of A Module C – Repertoire – which helps singers unour members, several area church choir directors and even a few church choir members who serve as choir mentors, section heads or rehearsal facilitators.

The RSCM (Royal School of Church Music) has developed a 5-level instructional program that provides modules and training resources for choir trainers. It is designed to improve singers sightreading and aural skills, appreciate musical repertoire and understand the context of a choir's singing.

There are workbooks for each of the program's levels (white, light blue, dark blue, red and yellow), which are divided into modules.


- $\square$  Module A Using the voice well which addresses good vocal technique. Everything from posture and breathing at the lower levels and the physiology of voice production at the higher levels.
- Module B Musical Skills and Understanding 5 develops knowledge of musical notation and theory, sight-reading and aural skills.

- derstand the musical and historical context of the music they sing.
- means to be part of a choir - commitment, punctuality and responsibility.
- $\checkmark$  Module E Choir in context choir as part of a larger community – choir benefits to members.

The workbooks contain explanations illustrated with diagrams, give singing and written exercises, quizzes and reference sections. To support the choir trainer, there are two books available for purchase:

- How to Use Voice for Life a comprehensive guide for choir trainers and directors
- plete resource for the teaching and assessment of aural awareness and sight-reading the Voice for Life scheme

## Overview of Practical Anthems Practically

September 27

Nancy Tapley and Paul Wharram facilitated this anthem reading session last September. In Nancy's presentation, she commented on each of her selections pointing out options for adapting the scores for smaller sized choir; - for example, certain passages that could be sung in unison or sections that could be sung with equal-voiced parts. She has used all of the anthems below which have been enjoyed by church congregations and singers alike.

- Clap Your Hands Dave and Jean Perry (Glory Sound)
- 10,000 Reasons Redman/Sorenson (Praise Song)
- Sing to the Lord with a Joyful Sound Gallina (Glory Sound)
- It is Well with My Soul Bliss/Berry (Hope Publishing)
- We Seek the Tiny King Schram (Lorenz Publishing)
- When the Angels Song is Silent Beall (Hope Publishing)
- I Will Give Jubilant Thanks Williams/ Barrett (Glory Sound)
- He Put a New Song in My Heart Barrett (Glory Sound)
- Let Us Be Bread Porter (GIA Celebration Series)

- Peace like a River Shafferman (Alfred Publishing)

Most of these pieces can be also be located and ordered from your favourite music suppler (such as JW Pepper or Sheet Music Plus).

Paul Wharram's approach to selecting the repertoire was to highlight sources of music where the cost of the music is both minimized (i.e. as low as possible cost per unit) and maximized (for as many singers and occasions as possible). We first looked at music selected from four specific compilations.

- Worship Openers II Introits that Work! -Hope Publishing - \$4.95 (US) \$6.59 (CA) for 12 selections with an average cost per selection - \$0.60
- The Pick-Up Anthem Book Volume II -Arranged by Stan Pethel, Lorenz Publishing - \$6.95 (US) \$9.28 (CA) for 9 selections with an average cost per selection -\$1.03
- Easy Anthems for Classic Worship Volume
  4 Compiled and arranged by Jane Holstein, Hope Publishing \$8.95 (US)
  \$11.92 (CA) for 8 selections with an average cost per selection \$1.49
- Hymns We Love to Sing Larry Pugh, Editor - Lorenz Publishing - \$8.95 (US) \$11.92 (CA) for 8 selections with an average cost per selection - \$1.49

(individual or churches) who pay an annual fee of \$139 (US). Unlike some other membership sites, this does not renew automatically and can be rejoined at any time without penalty. With membership comes the opportunity to preview, listen, download and copy any number of pieces as you wish for use in your church. You can browse by category (choir, instrumental, Psalms, collections, etc), by special days/celebrations (Advent, Lent, Easter, Christmas), by voicings (children's' choir, Unison singing, 2-part, SAB and SATB, organ, handbell choirs, etc) and by Liturgical Calendar with suggestions for each Sunday. In addition to being able to view the complete scores of music (as pdfs) and download them for reprint, most of the pieces come with a downloadable MP3 recording to play for your choir at rehearsal or to send home with them for study. A free preview trial period is possible if you sign up.

Participants were each given a binder with instructions and notes about St. James Press as well as copies of 8 pieces that the choir directors in attendance have permission to reproduce and use with their choirs by extension of this reading session. There was also a copy of an organ Fanfare on In Dulci Jubilo by Don Michael Dicie given to each one in attendance for their personal use. 




# Farly Christmas Presents

Here are three suggestions I have found which are easily accessible and a joy to play.




# A Christmas Suite, Gordon Young, Hope Publishing, 1970). (Out of print)


No doubt the oldest of the presents for you. For me, Mr. Young is both moderately easy and very difficult, and at times "off putting" in his harmonies. In this suite, Mr. Young gives us 4 pieces that are among his easiest to play. From the big chords of Adeste Fideles, his pedal work of In Dulci Jubilo, he gives us a dancelike God Rest you and the haunting Nunc Dimittis. This collection is worth the hunt.

### An Advent Suite, David Cherwien, The Sacred Music Press, 2006.

This collection of 3 pieces is the hardest of the presents today. Mr. Cherwien takes us on an Advent journey to Christmas with familiar hymns with his own twist on them. He starts with the longing of Come Thou Long Expected Jesus, to the mysterious O Come O come Emmanuel, and ends triumphantly with Lift up Your Heads.

# Carols for the Organ, Mark Hayes (arranged by Douglas E. Wagner), Lorenz, 2013).



# <u> Pipe Organs and Temperature</u>

settings for a room housing a pipe organ. This article will hopefully clarify the subject and allow good decisions to be made for the proper care of their pipe organs.

When we blow across a glass soda bottle, the resulting hooty sound is not the sound of the air rushing across the opening but the sound of the air in the bottle vibrating or resonating. The same is true when a flutist plays a note. The air column inside the flute body resonates, which is the sound we hear. It is the same with organ pipes. The air inside the pipe becomes a resonating air column. Simple enough.

That air in the pipe has weight. That weight changes with temperature. Warm air expands, so it is denser. Without getting into a physics lesson on the molecular level, pitch goes up with temperature increase, down with temperature decrease. A 15 degree Fahrenheit changes alters an organ pitch by about a quarter tone. One degree Fahrenheit change affects Middle C by about 2 cycles per second. Still simple enough.

From here, it gets a bit more complicated, but not much. As the temperatures go up and down, inevitably so does the humidity. Efforts to control the temperature (heating, air conditioning, opening windows) also affects humidity in a big way. In the last column, we discussed how humidity affects organs. In a nutshell, organs are made of wood that expands or decreases with humidity. Large swings in humidity (which occur with temperature changes) puts organs out of tune and increases maintenance costs. In fact, controlling the climate around a pipe organ can have a significant impact on its tuning and maintenance schedule. For example, the Marcussen pipe organ on the campus of Wichita State University in Kansas is carefully kept at 72 degrees Fahrenheit and 50% humidity year round and requires tuning and maintenance only once every four years. Its Danish caretakers credit meticulous climate control. Also, leather materials last longer at this humidity level. There are 3000 leather pouches in the 91 year old Cooper Aeolian Organ at Morris Sutton Funeral Home. They also maintains a steady temperature and humidity. Every one of those pouches still function and none have yet been replaced.

Many people want to know about the proper temperature So, the ideal condition is to maintain a steady temperature. The worst scenario is to allow a room to be unheated, then bring it up to temperature only when it is used. I used to maintain an organ in Lambeth that was only heated on Sunday. That instrument had more things go wrong with it than any other instrument I ever worked on. Since it is obviously expensive to maintain steady temps, the best alternative is to minimize the difference between the coldest temperature and operating temperature. Many churches have found that it is less expensive to keep the low temperature a bit higher, say 55-65 degree Fahrenheit, than to allow the church to get really cold, say 35-40 degrees. The walls, furniture and floor also must be warmed up. This means the church is flooded with an extended onrush of hot dry air, which further dries out the organ.

> Generally, the less the temperature changes, the better. It becomes a question of relative costs. A church may save costs (or think they are) by allowing the church to get cold when not in use, but it will undoubtedly cause the organ to be more unreliable and not sound as good as is possible.

> My suggestion is to keep the low temperature at 60 or 65 degrees Fahrenheit and bump it up to 68-70 degrees a few hours before services. The furnace will not have to work nearly as hard to raise the temperature a few degrees. Also get a few temperature/humidity gauges which are available at hardware stores. This will tell you if you have a problem with dry air. Organs should never be subjected to less than 30% humidity. Ideal is 45-50%. Pianos and stringed instruments also like this humidity range.
