The format for the evening is as follows:


- 6:00 pm College Service of Worship (featuring scholarship students on the organ)

Organ Skills for the Pianist

Ron Dossenbach and I conducted a workshop on the skills required by pianists to gain a degree of comfort and expertise in playing the organ.

Items discussed and demonstrated were the difference in terms of actual touch related to the keys on the piano vs. the organ. The most obvious being the sustainability of the organ pipe vs. the decaying of sound once a piano key has been struck.

In addition, we discussed the importance of fingering substitutions to gain a fluid and legato progression, as well as pedaling, where we encouraged toe and heel action, and the proper use of stops particularly when accompanying a congregation.

Proper introduction of a hymn, in terms of setting a suitable and reliable tempo was deemed important. It was noted that most hymns seem to have a tempo "groove," meaning that a certain tempo is most typically suited for a particular hymn.

Several volunteers came forward to play the organ to try some of the newly found items of information. This resulted in understanding that results are best obtained through regular and consistent practice on the organ manuals and pedal keyboard.

We thank all the participants that took part in the workshop!


Celebration of Music

Simple Gifts of Christmas

A December Sunday afternoon. The lights dim, emphasizing the blaze of stained glass windows flooding the former chapel with brilliance. From the quiet, the old Shaker melody for the poem "Simple Gifts" steals in, organ and piano exchanging tentative comments with each other.

So began the concert on December 16 featuring Gregory Butler at the piano with this writer at the organ. From there, we offered an appreciative audience of 122 favourite works such as the Warsaw Concerto and Denis Bédard's Duet Suite, interspersed with less familiar pieces, especially the recent Suite for Organ and Piano by Canadian Ruth Watson Henderson. Jointly sponsored by the School of Creative Arts and our RCCO centre, it was gratifying to learn that our program at the Heritage Room in Assumption Hall raised a total of \$800 for scholarship funds for both organizations. Sharing in an organ-piano concert, concluding with a thrilling audience carol sing, led by Paul Wharram, was a thrill for both Greg and myself.

One Stop at a Time

The organ has so many buttons and controls that most of us are either overwhelmed or rarely come close to using much of the tonal palette available to us. One response to this is to start small. Try exploring one stop only. This is more involved than one might think. If possible, it is helpful to look into the chamber and look at the rank of pipes in question. This provides a great visual aid later on when thinking about the stop. Is it metal, wooden, open, stopped? Where is it located in the chamber?

First, play every note in the rank. This also informs you of any issues like dead notes, or pipes that do not sound correctly. Try the stop with the expression shutters open and closed, if the stop is enclosed. Sometimes, a stop sounds quite differently when the shutters are closed besides being quieter. Try playing a melody, then try it again, one, then two octaves higher. Does it sound nice with a tremulant? Most flutes sound rather pleasant with a tremulant, especially in the higher registers. (Some sound very nice even when chords are played.) Can it be used as a solo stop with another softer stop?

Invent little exercises to put that single rank of pipes through all kinds of uses, good and bad. A stop's strengths and weaknesses can be quickly gleaned in this manner. After only a few minutes, a fuller awareness of this stop's potential will be yours.

By putting the focus on one stop, the organ becomes less overwhelming. Organists are quite insulated from the sound making part of the organ, more so than any other instrument. This helps to overcome that.

The next day, try another stop. These are wonderful and unique instruments that we are fortunate to be able to play. This little exercise helps us to explore it.

(card with sausage roll appetizers) Wienerflöte, which means 'Vienna Flute', is a wood flute pipe brighter than the Flauto Dolce and is often found as an 8 ft or 4 ft solo stop. The name Wienerflöte lacks all etymological or historical foundation. On the Third Manual of the Walcker Organ in the Cathedral of Vienna there is a Wienerflöte 8 ft. Wienerflöte is a useful stop, not only as a solo stop, but useful in combination with the Oboe stop. The pipes of the Wienerflöte are open wood, quadrangular and have inverted circular or semicircular mouths, partly over or against which are adjusted sloping caps.

I will say I had some fun filling out the application form. Age? Two categories, under 25 and over 25... that was easy... waaay over! Musical Background? How about 'piano lessons at home from Mildred Hall, 1955 to 1963'. Involvement in activities other than music? Well, for starters 40 years as a Professional Engineer, 25 of it as Windsor's Traffic and City Engineer. Interest in playing the organ for church services? Better be up front here... I'm the Organist and Choir Director at St. John's Anglican Church in Leamington... that had better count!

Fortunately my application was accepted, so I am quite likely the oldest (could we maybe say most life experienced) candidate to be awarded this wonderful bursary. How could that come to be? It's a long story... I started playing piano as a small child growing up on the farm where I now live, in rural Learnington. My dad played piano and sang, we attended church and Sunday School, and so both music generally, and church music specifically were both part of our normal routine. Later, in my university days, when my friends started to get married, they would ask me to play at their weddings: that was my first exposure to playing the pipe organ. And then, after graduation and moving across Canada with my career, the churches I attended were constantly in need of people to play for services and it was always difficult to say no. So I did it. I followed my ear, I had enough basic keyboard knowledge to get through, and people were very generous in saying they liked it.

And so, it turned out that I filled in and backed up on the pipe organ for 40 years. More recently in 2014, the position of organist at St. John's became available; my wife and I had been attending church here since moving back to my farm in 2006. Having retired from my public sector career in 2011, I was in the process of rebalancing my life, which now includes consulting engineering with RC Spencer and Associates, as well as being on the adjunct faculty at the University of Windsor Dept of Civil and Environmental Engineering, not to mention home renovations, gardens, and all of that. Although unexpected, taking on the organist position seemed to offer me an opportunity that fit in with my rebalancing objectives. No formal training? Aha... RCCO to the rescue!

Although I could 'make it through a service', my professional background in other fields left me asking a lot of questions about the technical aspects of playing, and the physical aspects of the organ itself. While I have no aspirations beyond my current duties, I do want to play out of a sound knowledge base, and learn to play to the best of my ability. So I am most grateful to have the opportunity to get some real training from my friend and mentor David Palmer, sponsored by the RCCO Windsor-Essex Centre. Even after only a couple of lessons, I have learned things I did not know, and am now applying them to my regular preparation and playing.

Scholarship has been a fundamental part of the RCCO since its inception and it is important for the Windsor-Essex Centre to continue to promote it!
