From our Chaplain

Why now so full of heaviness my soul?
Why such disquiet deep within my heart?
Brian Ruttan "Just As the Deer"

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Many years ago in Lent one of the women in the weekly bible study in my parish remarked, "Lent is such a heavy season." To my way of thinking it should be a heavy season. It should be a challenging experience where through self-examination and prayer we experience a new awareness of the full weight of our sin. More often than not when we hear about heaviness in the bible it refers to the experience of sin. That is because when we become separated from God by our failures and shortcomings, when we walk apart from God, the full weight of life rests squarely on our shoulders. It is a staggering burden that can leave our souls barren and empty.

Lent is a penitential season where we take the time to focus intently on turning back to God. It is a season where we intentionally make time to attend to the aspects of our faith that we neglect in the busyness of every-day life. It is a time where we take stock of our lives and recognise where they are inconsistent with the way of life that was demonstrated to us by Christ. As we make our way through this season we ought to begin to feel the weight of sin in a fairly profound way. The music, hymns and liturgy of the Lenten season help us to recognise our sins and move us to repentance. Lent is a season where we feel the heaviness of sin in our souls.

Lent leads us into Holy Week and to a remarkable experience of God's grace. As we walk with our Lord through the last days of his life, we find ourselves on Good Friday following him on the way to Golgotha. And as we begin that walk with him, we find that he has lifted the heaviness of sin from us and has taken it on himself. The burden of the cross that Christ carried through Jerusalem and out to what is called The Place of the Skull was the weight of the sins of humanity. He carried that weight himself and lifted the crushing heaviness from our souls. The weight of the sins of the whole world destroyed his life, but three days later Christ rose from the dead. This season is not just an opportunity to come to an awareness of the full weight of sin, but it is also an opportunity to come to a new awareness of the fullness of God's grace, mercy and love. Because of Christ's death and resurrection, we are able to lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely to us and go into the presence of God where our barren souls "blossom with new life." Thanks be to God!

Master Class

The Master Class took place at St. Stephen's Anglican church, 5280 Howard Ave., in Oldcastle, Ontario. The RCCO was welcomed by the St. Stephen's Community; and are grateful to the Parish for the use of the facilities for this event.

The facilitator was Dr. David Palmer; the two students were Michelle Park and Evan Su.

As always, David Palmer's constructive comments and positive guidance made it possible for Michelle and Evan to feel comfortable and confident and both students performed well.

The following are Michelle's own comments, which include the titles of the selections she played at the Master class.

"Henry Smart (1813-1879) composed the organ piece "Prayer" found in The Amateur Organist Volume 77. This is a very expressive piece that I was able to play for the Master class, with a very strong, singing voice in the right hand. This was a very good match for me because it allowed me to practice pedaling, substitution, holding all the given notes at a time, and understanding the differences in sound between the Swell and Great stops. I'm excited to play full organ pieces like this during communion, and my next goal is to add crescendo where indicated. For the hymn, I played "Almighty God, Thy Word is Cast." The music is composed by Francis Vincent Novello (1781-1861). I enjoyed this new hymn because it has a strong, steady 4/4 beat, helping both the choir and I keep track and pause between the four verses. I was taught to pedal every bottom note and play the alto line with the left hand, and after practicing the right hand, left hand and feet independently it was much easier to put it all together. I look forward to playing future hymns during church services and filling the room with entirely new sounds."

Evan played next and the selections he played are the following:

Two Trios from the Organ Method by Marcel Dupré;

"Azmon" by Carl G. Gläser, 1784-1829

The Hymn Evan played was "Yours the Hand that Made Creation."

Here are Evan's comments re. The Master Class:

"The annual Organ Master Class was a fun event that I experienced for the first time. It was a great class to hear others play and see the progress that we made. I also liked having the experience of playing in front of more than just my teacher. I got some meaningful feedback on my performance and how to improve.

The Master Class was fun and interesting overall."

In addition to Mr. David Palmer, the facilitator, in attendance were members of the RCCO executive, Henry Boon, Scholarship Chair, and RonDossenbach, Organ advisor.


Family members of both Michelle and Evan as well as a few members of St. Stephen's congregation attended the event.


Social Get-together



The Final Touch

Most of you are aware of the story of the Cooper Aeolian Organ located at the Morris Sutton Funeral Home. If, not, in a small nutshell, this is a player pipe organ first installed in Prohibition entrepreneur James Cooper's COOPER COURT in Walkerville. In 1946, as the mansion was razed, the organ moved to the new Morris Funeral Home to serve as a chapel organ. It deteriorated over the years until 2000, by which time it was unplayable. In 2011 I began a restoration. It now is completely restored and functional. All the original pipes and components are present. Except one.

I have given several demonstration tours of the organ, and have always pointed out the one missing component - a small brass lamp originally installed to illuminate the spoolbox. The screw holes on two mounting surfaces clearly showed that something was missing. Earlier this month, after nine years of searching, an identical lamp surfaced in Bloomfield Hills.

Aeolian No. 1601 was installed in Los Angeles in 1926. Somehow, years later, the console found its way to New York state. A Bloomfield Hills organist purchased two consoles from the New York owner with the intent of using them for Hauptwerk digital conversions. One of the consoles was No. 1601. The Aeolian console proved unsuitable for Hauptwerk purposes. Finally, it needed to be disposed of. I got wind of its situation from Ian Mason, who is always on the lookout for things like this for me. I was given permission to come and take whatever was of use.

This included a fully intact Duo Art player mechanism within the console. I removed this (lots of dirty work!) as well as the switches and other parts that may come in handy in future maintenance of the Cooper Aeolian Organ and other Aeolians. But the special prize was the spoolbox lamp.

Until now, the Cooper organ seemed like a well restored antique car missing its hood ornament. Now, its missing lamp was found! But it was in a very humble condition. The brass had corroded such that the colour was like a kiwi. And it had long since stopped working. But half a bottle of Brasso and Silvo, and two and a half days of scrubbing and repairing and re-soldering returned the lamp to its former appearance. It is switched on by a brass switch plate located on the side of the console since 1924 which operated the original lamp, as seen in the accompanying picture. It has a lovely worn in feel.

The lamp is quite small, as it has to find behind the music rack. No other lamp of this size was ever made for other purposes, which is why it was so hard to come by. It does not illuminate the music rack, only the spoolbox. The rolls included instructions as the roll passed by, so a light was necessary.

Finally the Cooper Aeolian Organ is complete.
