President's Message

Dear friends,

As I sit here on the first day of autumn 2021, I can't help but reflect, with the help of the raindrops outside, on the past year and a half and how it has changed us in so many ways.

Congratulations Tate Pumfrey

Congratulations and commendations to Chatham Centre RCCO member (our youngest member!), Tate Pumfrey. Tate had the honour of having his composition, Exultemus Domino, played by Martin Larkin in the opening selection in the opening program of this year's edition of Organ Festival Canada. Tate's composition was played on the organ of St. James Anglican Church, Toronto.

From the Program Notes:

"Tate Pumfrey (b. 1998) is a rising composer from Thamesville, Ontario, and is currently completing a master's degree in composition at York University, where he studies with Stephanie Martin.

His exuberant "Toccata - Exultemus Domino" is a bold new work, inspired by Psalm 95 (Venite, exultemus Domino). Rapidly changing metres, colourful harmonies, and driving rhythms frame a hymn-like middle section which appears toward the coda in recapitulation.

The originality and vitality of this work make it a sure and welcome addition to the contemporary repertory of Canadian organ music."

When you get to the bridge, modulate back down to F# minor and alternate a 4/4 bar with a 7/4 bar. On the last A section go into double time and slowly modulate back to G minor." The singer says: "Wow, I don't think I can remember all of that." The pianist says: "Well, that's what you did last time."

Organ Inventory Project

We are excited to announce our Organ Inventory Project. It is our hope to document every pipe organ in Windsor-Essex County. We currently have a list of organs.

To date we have documented two organs. Epworth United Church and Church of the Epiphany. Both can be viewed on our website (www.rcco-windsor.com) follow the linke to "Our organs"

When you get a request from Dale Burkholder or Ron Dossenbach for a visit please don't be worried. The visit will take about an hour. Things we will be doing is:

- Taking numerous pictures both inside and outside the church along with the console and pipe chamber.
- Asking for a stoplist of the organ (indicating digital pipes).
- Asking for the history of the organ
- Asking about interesting information on the organ
- Playing a piece of music about 3-4 minutes long that highlights the organ (and creating a video of the space the organ is in).
- Asking for 2 hymns "Joyful, joyful we adore Thee" and "O God our help in ages past". Registration to be the principal chorus on each manual. Played on the choir (If you have one), Swell then the Great.

If you have any of the information listed above in electronic form you can email them to Dale Burkholder (gangalf "at" live (dot) com) before hand.

A Few Scholarship Facts

As with just about everything, the RCCO Windsor/Essex Centre Scholarship program has been impacted by Covid in the sense that lessons were put on hold for a time and new students were hesitant to begin a journey into the world of playing the organ. Yet, one student remained steadfastly involved and is making progress with great strides. This is remarkable if one is aware of the fact that Evan Su, our scholarship student, is not only studying organ but piano as well. In addition, he maintains a high average at his high school program at Vincent Massey Secondary School in Windsor.

Evan is in the second year of our Scholarship program and will be able, in short order, to begin considering providing substitute services at churches in the Windsor-Essex area.

This is one of the interesting benefits of being involved in discovering the joys and importance connected with studying the organ.

Several organ Scholarship students have availed themselves of additional funds by playing in churches and thereby making it possible to help with postsecondary education costs.

With a Grade VIII Royal Conservatory background in piano, the young pianist is a perfect candidate for the RCCO Beginner scholarship program.

After an audition, the successful candidate will be enrolled in 12 lessons and assigned a teacher with RCCO accreditation.

One aspect that should be given attention is the fact that playing both the organ and piano, leads to the one complimenting the other. Organ playing requires a certain technique to perform effectively the playing of legato passages, this in turn would aid the student in playing legato at the piano. Conversely, piano tech-

nique, including scales, arpeggios and the like, are of great benefit to enhance passages at the organ that require brilliance and virtuosity.

Playing both organ and piano results in a versatile musician with the added bonus of being able to provide instruction in both instruments.



Strategic Plan 2021 – 2024

In last June's newsletter, we introduced to you the approved RCCO Strategic Plan 2021-24 and we committed to share more fully the goals and objectives for the next four years.

Perhaps the most significant element of the new Strategic Plan is the new vision and mission statements, which will be transformative as we rebrand, refocus and refine our programming to reflect that the organ. It is believed that organ music casts a much broader sphere of influence and interest beyond its traditional faith-based purposes.

We promote a vibrant community that engages all people in the transformative power of the organ and its music

We are the ultimate resource for all things organ

Increase existing resources and implement new initiatives for:

In order for us to comply with these new directions and be part of the rebranding exercise, we feel there needs to be a shift towards more secular uses of the organ and an outreach to audiences, which we have in the past not been able to engage. Many people relate the pipe organ and its music solely to the church. The increasing use of digital organs, however, gives the possibility for the organ to be played and heard in non-traditional settings (as well as in churches).

We acknowledge that this shift in focus may not sit well with all members. But keeping an open mind and exploring the broadened potential of the organ can be a positive influence on our programming.

Organ Updates

We have been tracking the progress of three organs.

Binkley United Church

Breaking News! The Netherlands Reformed Congregation in St. Catharines has been very interested in the 1931 three manual 10 rank Casavant organ in Hamilton, which is in the former Binkley United Church that is scheduled to be torn down. The NRC congregation recently had an open vote on whether to proceed with a proposal put forth by Jan Van Der Stad. The Choir division was never installed but was prepared for. The proposal will add a Choir division, the Swell will receive a Vox Humana, the Great will receive the church's current Mixture and Trumpet, the Pedal with get

a 16' reed, and, most importantly, the Choir will have a five rank Cornet stop, which is a fundamental sound in the Dutch Reformed tradition, totalling 29 ranks. The congregation responded to the Organ Committee's hard work and detailed presentation with a near unanimous yes vote. Great news! See pics of the current rear portion of the unique nine-sided sanctuary and the rendering of the organ as it will appear. The organ never had a facade or a case in Hamilton or in its original location in Niagara Falls. It will now have one that complements the sanctuary without overwhelming it. Yay!
