President's Message

President's Message

As we embark on our Lenten journeys each year, we often think of those journeys as personal and private. We enter a somewhat solitary season of reflection, prayer, fasting, reading and meditation. Indeed, the liturgical season of Lent gives us opportunities for personal reflection like no other time in the church year.

I find it quite interesting that in some Catholic Church traditions, the playing of the organ (and other musical instruments) in Lent is not allowed only to support the singing. In some settings, the rule during lent is no mixtures or reeds, keeping as far as possible to 8' and 4' diapasons. In other settings, soloists or singers are not accompanied by piano or organ for the purpose of providing.

The rationale is to have a contrast between Lenten worship and that in the Season of Easter. It is felt that the joy of Easter can shine forth more gloriously. This long-standing custom has been eased in many places in recent decades. In its place, quiet, meditative, and less-flashy organ music is encouraged.

In many of our churches, the limited or non-existent

playing of the organ during Lenten Services would not be easily received by our congregants. Nevertheless, the music that we choose during Lent should have the power to strike a chord deep within one's theological and spiritual approach to their faith. So too, and especially the hymns that we choose to sing in Lent should be selected with care.

For the first time in many years as a church organist, I have been given the responsibility to select hymns for each Sunday. Our new Rector at the Church of the Epiphany, Rev. Paul Silcox, prefers that I make those choices. So, I'm being faced with a new challenge, to provide the members of my congregation with opportunities to engage fully as the worshipping body and to inspire them in the work of the church.

During Lent, we forego the 'Alleluias', we should select time-tested hymns that we can sing from within our souls. Here are few of the hymns that in my mind, do just that.

- 🎜 Alas! And Did My Savior Bleed
- ☐ In the Cross of Christ, I Glory
- What Wondrous Love Is This
- Ah, Holy Jesus


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Land acknowledgement

Registering for Success teaser

Registering for Success

Our Centre recently offered a workshop on registration that received a poor response. So there will be a series of short articles in this and forthcoming newsletters that tease out some of the helpful subject matter.

Most organists do not use registrations that change frequently or in an interesting way. One way to improve in this area is by using the preset pistons that most organs have. There are three types: general, divisional, and dedicated purpose pistons (Swell to Great, Great to Pedal etc).

Divisionals

Divisionals affect one only one keyboard at a time. It is common for organists to set the pistons with the softest settings on the left of the divisional row and gradually getting louder as the pistons proceed from left to right. If you know there is a gradual increase in volume from left to right, it is easy to make changes on the fly extemporaneously. Some organists avoid the use of pistons, or simply use one before a prelude or hymn and do not use them during the music. This is antithetical to their purpose which is to be used during the piece. When playing on the Great, try hitting a Swell piston so the sound will be different and therefore interesting when you next play the Swell.

Many organs now feature many different levels of memory for the pistons. This makes it possible for customs settings for a single piece. With 100 levels of memory, why not dedicate a level of memory to a single piece?

I suggest you give the divisional pistons a try if you are not a regular user. And if you are, try using them more often during the pieces.

The Rev'd Robert Clifford took up the pastoral leadership of All Saints' Anglican Church, Windsor in September 2017 coming from Trinity Anglican Church, Port Burwell; St. Luke's Anglican Church, Vienna; and, Trinity Anglican Church, Aylmer.

His ordination to the Diaconate took place on November 29th, 2012 and to the Priesthood on June 6th, 2013 at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul (Anglican), London ON.

Robert took a Master of Divinity degree from Huron University College, Western University. Additionally, he obtained an honours undergraduate degree in Political Science, with a significant minor in History, from King's University College, Western University.

He has worked in the past for both a Federal cabinet minister and a Provincial shadow cabinet minister in their constituency offices helping people to resolve their concerns. He has also worked in human resources, quality assurance and administration for a family pharmacy and escalated customer service for a multinational hotel chain.

While at school, Robert was blessed with a placement at St. Andrew's Anglican Church, Chippewa and Zion Anglican Church, Oneida. He is grateful to The Rev'd Canon Gaye Whippey for the opportunity to minister among the First Nations communities that she serves. Indeed, he feels that the parishioners ministered him to as much as he provided ministry to the community.

He also served the parish of St. John's Anglican Church, Tillsonburg, during his final year of studies. He is grateful for the warmth of the reception he received there and the significant practical teaching offered by The Rev'd Bill Ward and The Rev'd Deacon Vermell Stevens.

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
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As part of the process toward ordination, the Diocese of Huron requires that candidates complete a Clinical Pastoral Education unit at an area hospital under the supervision of qualified pastoral care practitioners. During the Summer of 2010, Robert was placed at St. Joseph's Regional Mental Healthcare - London (formerly London Psychiatric Hospital) as a Student Chaplain. Here he learned about providing pastoral care in some of the most difficult of circumstances with which people can struggle.

Robert, in 2015, was asked to provide Chaplaincy to the Diocesan Lay Readers; in this capacity he acts as an examining Chaplain to those seeking to be licensed to this ministry and a pastoral Chaplain to those already licensed. For Synod 2016, Robert provided clergy leadership in the organization and running of the Synod of the Diocese (basically an Annual General Meeting) as the Honourary Clerical Secretary to Synod. For 2017, prior to his move to Essex Deanery, Robert was the Regional Dean of the Deanery of Delaware under the leadership of Archdeacon Nancy Adams. Also, he presently serves on the Grants and Loans and the Archives Committees of the Diocese of Huron.

In his continuing education, Robert focuses his attention on preaching and ways to reach out into the communities he serves to make known the love of God.

Robert is feeling blessed to be ministering alongside the people of downtown Windsor and prays that his ministry will, by his words and actions, carry the Good News of God's love to this corner of the Kingdom of God. He emphasizes that all are welcome to services at All Saints' at 8am and 10am Sundays and 11:30am Thursdays.

Wesleyan Hymn Festival

On March 12 over 50 people came out to celebrate the hymns of the Wesley family. The day began with the hymn tune Beecher which was written specifically for the words of "Love Divine all loves excelling.

The first hymn was "And are we yet alive". Written for the annual gatherings of the early Methodist but took on a new dimension with the advent of covid-19.

We sang several of the over 6000 hymns written by John Wesley, Charles Wesley, Samuel Wesley and Samuel Sebastian Wesley. We had several "medleys" where the same tune was used but the verses were from different hymns. We even learned about drunken leprechauns (appropriate for the day before St. Patrick's day). The hymns were expertly played by Michael Sewell and David Carle.

The massed choir included some friends we haven't seen for a while and beautifully sung "Covenant Prayer" the words of which were adapted from John Wesley's Covenant Service, 1780. Epworth's ringers added to the festivities by playing the chorus "Lead me Lord".



The day ended with a rousing rendition of "Christ the Lord is risen today". The third verse was sung by the massed choir accompanied by the Epworth Ringers. The final verse was accompanied with David Carle's free verse improvisation and the roof was raised with a stirring "AMEN!".



BUCO becomes TUCCO

The stranded organ in the former Blenheim United Church has been rescued and placed in a new location!

In 2020, the 1978 II/18 Principal pipe organ was at risk of going down with the wrecking ball. But Don Pole and I removed it days before the church was torn down to make way for senior citizen condominiums, which are nearly ready for occupation. They are one block from the main intersection and offer short walking distances to all services.

The organ was set up in Don's shop in Chatham where it was put into proper working condition with several of its shortcomings addressed. While we were looking for a new owner who would take the organ in its current state, Trinity United Church expressed an interest. The organist visited, liked it, and then sent a consultant to further examine it. His suggestion: buy. it. So they did, with some further requests. They wanted a new electric swell shade operator to replace the clunky 5 stage electropneumatic swell engine. They also wanted a new solo Trumpet with a 16' Trombone extension. And a new fully solid state control system. Finally, they were concerned the organ would not be strong enough for their sanctuary which seats 700 versus the 550 seating capacity in Blenheim. So Don casually suggested we could make an additional swell shade panel on the side of the swellbox facing the sanctuary. I did my best to control my eyes from rolling when this was mentioned! But we came to an agreement and spent most of 2022 rebuilding the organ. This Included a new support frame that is three feet higher than the original frame to allow the pipes to have better tonal egress from the twin chamber on either side of the chancel at the front of the church. We also suggested we restore functionality to 12 speaking facades pipes from the original 1901 Karn organ. A photo shows the new windchest and trunking.

On February 5, the truck arrived in Cobourg and was greeted by the most enthusiastic team of volunteers imaginable. Part of our agreement was that they would provide volunteer help to unload and install the organ. They did not disappoint. It was a joy to work with such a group. The installation was completed in two weeks, including the chimes in the balcony 70 feet away.

I have now heard this organ in three locations. It sounded good in Blenheim, which is why we did not want it to be destroyed. It sounded ok in the shop, but offered the kind of "too close" sound an organ tuner hears from inside the organ chamber. Then it was heard in Cobourg. The wonderful acoustical environment there

makes the organ sound like another instrument entirely, and in a very good way. In addition, the chambers were prepared to provide more tonal egress by receiving coats of hard glossy paint to bounce out the sound rather than absorb it. Finally, the higher placement of the organ windchests and the added shutter panel allow the organ to be loud enough and then some. A hymn can be led with as little as a single Open Diapason 8 stop.
